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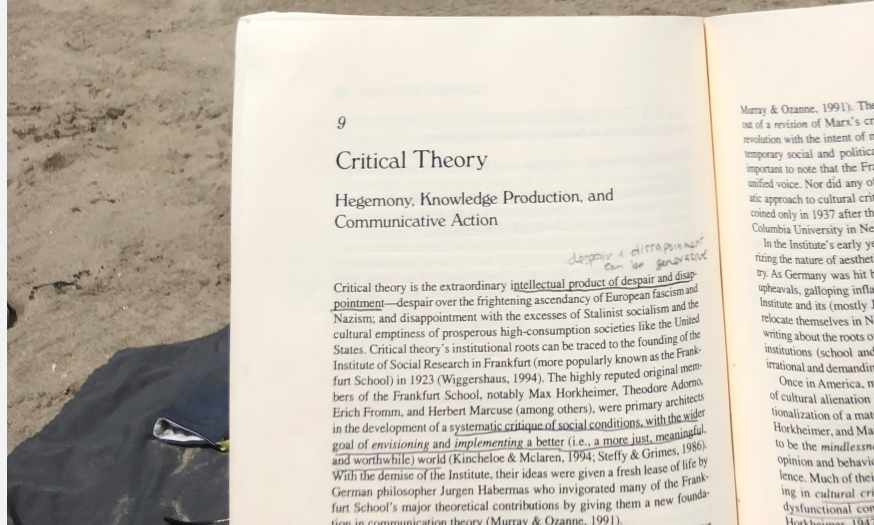

CRITICAL THEORY

- Critical theory is committed to the goals of social justice (axiology – value laden science)
- There is no single way to “do” critical theory
- Ideology-critique: “the incessant and systematic critique of ideological forces in every aspect of social life”
- The goal is to enhance public awareness of the sources of domination and initiate changes

CRITICAL RACE THEORY

- A lens or framework developed by Dr. Bell in the 1970s and 1980s for examining how systemic racism is woven into American law and institutions and how those systems perpetuate an uneven playing field for people of color.

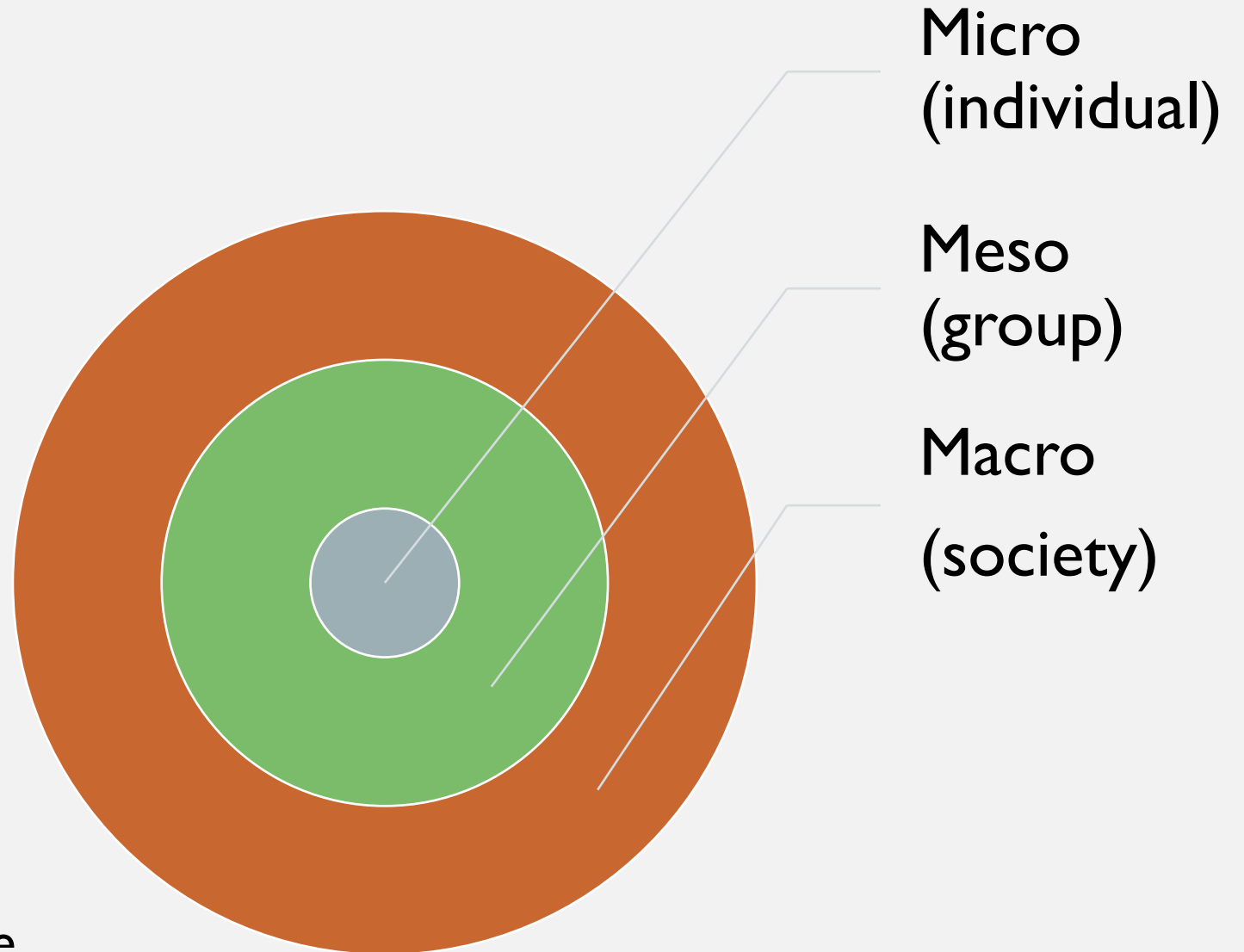

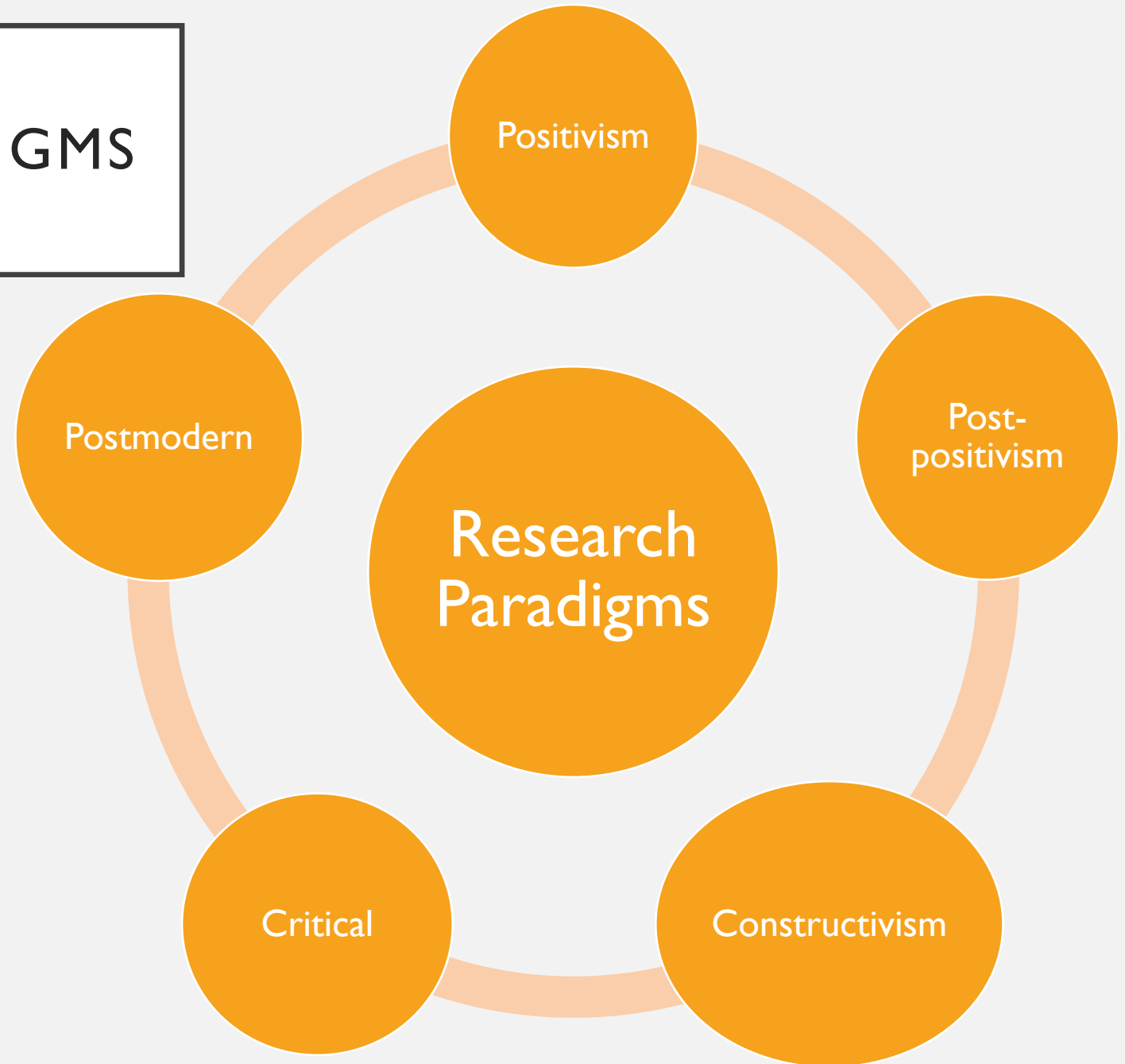
